

## LARGEST AMERICAN SHOW HAS NEW NAME

Great American Stamp Show is the new name of the event formerly known as APS Stampshow. The name change was prompted by the three major American stamp collector societies collaborating to produce one large national show annually.

For the past two years, the summer APS Stampshow has been combined with the National Topical Stamp Show. At the 2019 Stampshow, the American First Day Cover Society agreed to join forces with the American Philatelic Society and the American Topical Association instead of continuing to stage a separate event. The groups hope the combined effort will increase attendance and reduce expenses.

Members of the three societies were invited to vote online for a new show name this past fall. Of the five options, Great American Stamp Show had almost twice as many votes as Stampshow, the runner up contender. The final vote tally was:

## MAILING COSTS ARE RISING... AGAIN

In what has become an annual ritual the last Sunday of every January, the U.S. Postal Service is raising many of its rates, but not for domestic first-class letters, postcards and large envelopes.

Effective January 26, 2020, postal customers will pay more for parcels, Priority Mail, miscellaneous and commercial services. The overall increase is 1.9 percent, with Priority Mail Express rising 3.5 percent and Priority Mail climbing 4.1

20 years a winter show called Ameristamp Expo. It featured the national one-frame exhibit competition. The gathering more often than not failed to break even, so the final one with APS sponsorship was held in 2019 in Phoenix, Arizona.

The Stampshow name and one-frame competition has been reclaimed by the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors (AAPE), who started the event in 1993 but soon turned it over to the American Philatelic Society. To be held annually and combined with various national level shows, the first AAPE/AmeriStamp Expo will be held November 20-22 in conjunction with Chicogopex 2020.

percent, on average.

According to an October 9, 2019, Postal Service news release, "Although Mailing Services price increases are based on the Consumer Price Index, Shipping Services prices are primarily adjusted according to market conditions." The latter portion of the statement indicates why shipping rates are increasing considerably faster than inflation.

The cost of mailing a first-class letter remains 55¢ plus 15¢ for additional ounces up to 3½ ounces. Meter mail users still get a 5¢ ounce discount on the first ounce. Postcards remain at 35¢, but an international letter or postcard will now cost \$1.20 instead of \$1.15.

American Philatelic Society members who get sales circuits will find the cost of forwarding them by Priority Mail is 40¢ more; \$8.30 for the box and \$8.40 for the padded envelope.

Consequently, the number of pages of this bulletin will be reduced to reflect the two additional issues each year, and the appearance will be less pleasing to the eye due to tighter formatting. # 2020 UNITED STATES STAMP PROGRAM

So far, the 2020 U.S. stamp program will consist of 22 commemorative/special stamp issues, two more high value priority mail stamps, a presorted mail stamp and two postal stationery items.

As many issues have multiple designs or formats, there are 72 face different stamps costing \$69.55, including \$7.75 for a Priority Mail stamp and \$26.35 for a Priority Express Mail stamp. The two postal stationery items adds another \$8.30 in face value. Many items are sold only in booklet and pane formats that will run up the cost even more. One issue has both booklet and coil formats as well.

All the announced stamp issues are depicted in this article except those for the Hanukkah and Kwanzaa. There will likely be a more issues appearing; new Christmas stamps have yet to be seen. Unless otherwise noted in the descriptions, all items are Forever stamps with a current value of 55¢ per stamp. Much of the commentary below is adapted from various U.S. Postal Service news releases.

## Lunar New Year: Year of the Rat

The Year of the Rat stamp is the first in a new series of 12 stamps in the series. The Year of the Rat observance begins Jan. 25, 2020, and ends Feb. 11, 2021. Calling to mind the elaborately decorated masks used in the dragon dance often performed in Lunar New Year parades, this three-dimensional mask depicting a rat is a contemporary take on the long tradition of paper-cut folk art crafts created during this time of year.



## Presorted Star

The 10¢ Presorted Star stamp, sold in self-adhesive coils of 3,000 and 10,000, is intended for use by business mailers. This new stamp focuses on the vital components of the beloved American Stars and Stripes. The design includes one large white star, two white



and three red stripes, and a brilliant blue background, as well as lettering and three small stars in gold.

## Made of Hearts

This year's love stamp, Made of Hearts, features horizontal lines of red and pink hearts on a white background. Toward the center, various sized red hearts replace pink ones in a formation that creates one large red heart, the focal point of this graphic design.



## Big Bend National Park



The \$7.75 Priority Mail stamp and a like-designed Priority Mail stamped envelope, celebrate the beauty of the Big Bend region in West Texas, where river, mountain and desert ecosystems coexist in its vast expanses. The stamp art depicts the

Rio Grande flowing between the sheer limestone cliffs of Santa Elena Canyon in Big Bend National Park.

## Grand Island Ice Caves

The winter beauty of the Grand Island Ice Caves in Lake Superior appears on a new \$26.35 Priority Mail Express stamp. Located near Munising on Michigan's Upper Peninsula,



Grand Island is marked by massive sandstone bluffs that are especially dramatic in winter when lake water seeps into the crevices and caverns, forming magnificent ice curtains and icicles that hang like stalactites from ceilings. The stamp art depicts of these ever-changing ice caves looking toward the west at sunset.

## Gwen Ifill

The 43rd stamp in the Black Heritage series honors Gwen Ifill (1955–2016), one of America's most esteemed journalists. The stamp features a photo of Ifill taken in 2008 by photographer Robert Severi. Among the first African-Americans to hold prominent positions in both broadcast and print journalism, Ifill was a trailblazer.



## Let's Celebrate!

Let's Celebrate! is a replacement for the neon fireworks display/black background design introduced in 2011. It adds fun to celebratory greeting cards,



invitations and gift-bearing envelopes and packages. The letters in the word "celebrate," cast in a dark green hue, appear inside several brightly colored circles on a white background.

## Wild Orchids


The exotic beauty of orchids appear on 10 new stamps in booklets of 20 and coils of 3,000 and 10,000—smaller quantities of the coils will be available to philatelists. Each stamp features a photograph of one of nine species that grow wild in the United States: *Cypripedium californicum*, *Hexaletris spicata*, *Cypripedium reginae*, *Spiranthes odorata*, *Triphora trianthophoros*, *Platanthera grandiflora*, *Cyrtopodium polyphyllum*, *Calopogon tuberosus* and *Platanthera leucophaea*. Orchids also have common names, with some plants having several different names in popular use.

## Arnold Palmer

This stamp honors champion golfer Arnold Palmer (1929–2016). With drive and charisma, he helped transform a game once seen as a pastime for the elite into a sport enjoyed by the masses. In a career spanning more than six decades, he won 62 PGA Tour titles from 1955 to 1973. The stamp features James Drake's action photograph of Palmer at the 1964 United States Open at Congressional Country Club in Bethesda, MD.



## Maine Statehood

Maine's statehood bicentennial receives postal recognition this year. Nicknamed the Pine Tree State, Maine became the 23rd state in the Union on March 15, 1820. American painter Edward Hopper (1882–1967) was among the many prominent artists who sought the tranquility of the state's coastal towns during the summer. His painting *Sea at Ogunquit* (1914) captures the rugged beauty characteristic of Maine.



## Contemporary Boutonniere

Contemporary Boutonniere is a new Forever stamp similar in design to the two-ounce Garden Corsage stamp mentioned below. It can be used for wedding RSVP cards and is also perfect for party invitations, thank-you notes, announcements, birthday cards, Father's Day cards and other occasions when a beautiful stamp is fitting. The stamp features a photograph of an arrangement of a burgundy mini-cymbidium orchid bloom, a succulent and a touch of green hydrangea, accented with loops of variegated lily grass. These materials are on trend for today's modern designs.



## Garden Corsage

The Garden Corsage is a new two-ounce (70¢) stamp. This stamp can accommodate the weight of heavy invitations for birthdays, weddings, anniversaries and other items that require extra postage. The stamp features a photograph of a corsage containing a spray of peach roses and a pink ranunculus, accented with deep-pink heather and seeded eucalyptus. A cream-colored lace ribbon entwines the flowers. Garden Corsage is similar in design to the Contemporary Boutonniere Forever stamp.



## Chrysanthemum (Global)

Chrysanthemum is a new Global Forever international rate (\$1.20) stamp that can be used to mail a one-ounce letter to any country where First-Class Mail International service is available. The stamp is round and features a photograph of a pink chrysanthemum on a white background. Taken from above, the photograph highlights the intricate beauty of the bloom. The flower is from an existing photograph by Hong Vo.



## Earth Day

On April 22, 1970, 20 million American, about 10 percent of the population, took to the streets, college campuses and hundreds of cities to protest environmental ignorance and demand a new way forward for our planet. For the 50th anniversary of that occasion, a stamp is being issued featuring a playful painting of the planet, with small green lines surrounding Earth and hand-lettered text.

## American Gardens

This pane of 20 stamps features 10 different photographs of botanic, country estate and municipal gardens taken between 1996 and 2014 by Allen Rokach. The gardens include: Biltmore Estate Gardens (North Carolina); Brooklyn Botanic Garden (New York); Chicago Botanic Garden (Illinois); Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens (Maine); Dumbarton Oaks Garden

(District of Columbia); The Huntington Botanical Gardens (California); Alfred B. Maclay Gardens State Park (Florida); Norfolk Botanical Garden (Virginia); Stan Hywet Hall & Gardens (Ohio); and Winterthur Garden (Delaware).

## Voices of the Harlem Renaissance

One of the great artistic and literary movements in American history was the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s, which firmly established African Americans as a vital force in literature and the arts. Twenty stamps showcase four stylized pastel portraits of these literary figures: writer, philosopher, educator and arts advocate Alain Locke; novelist Nella Larsen; bibliophile and historian Arturo Alfonso Schomburg; and poet Anne Spencer. African-inspired motifs are used as background elements of each portrait. The pane header shows a cityscape in silhouette with a sun in its midst and the title "Voices of the Harlem Renaissance." The artist for these stamps was Gary Kelley.

## Hip Hop

The Postal Service celebrates hip hop with four new stamps in a pane of 20. Since its inception more than four decades ago, the electrifying music, dance and art movement has profoundly influenced American and global popular culture. The stamp art features photographs taken by Cade Martin that depict four elements

of hip hop: MCing (rapping), b-boying (breakdancing), DJing and graffiti art. The bold, digitally tinted images are intended to appear in motion. The name of the element featured appear across the top of each stamp. The stamps are highlighted with a vivid yellow, green, red and black color scheme. The title of the stamps, printed in red and black, is centered on the top of the pane.



## Enjoy the Great Outdoors

The Enjoy the Great Outdoors Forever stamps feature the many ways individuals experience America's abundance of natural beauty. These hand-sketched and painted designs by Gregory Manchese depict five different scenes of outdoor activities — building a sand castle, hiking, cross-country skiing, canoeing and biking. The format of these stamps has not yet been announced.

## Fruits & Vegetables

The classic beauty of still-life paintings by Robert Papp is seen in a booklet of 20 stamps featuring 10 different portraits of one kind of fruit or vegetable: red and black plums, heirloom and cherry tomatoes, carrots,



lemons, blueberries, red and green grapes, lettuces, strawberries, eggplants and figs.

### Thank You

Four new stamps in a booklet of 20 will be available for notes, cards and letters of thanks sent to acknowledge a favor, an act of kindness, a job well done or gifts sent for any occasion. Highlighted in gold foil are the words “Thank you” in cursive script and a floral design that swirls through and around the words.



Each stamp features one of four background colors: blue gray, deep blue, muted green or soft maroon.

### 19th Amendment: Women Vote



display the official colors of the National Woman’s Party — purple, white and gold.

### Drug Free USA

This Drug Free USA Forever stamp will help further raise awareness about the dangers of drug abuse, and the toll it is taking on families and



This stamp commemorates the centennial of the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which guarantees women the right to vote. Inspired by historic photographs, the original art by Nancy Stahl features a stylized illustration of suffragists marching in a parade or other public demonstration. The clothes they wear and the banners they bear

to convey a scene of desolate beauty at the end of the Pilgrims’ long journey to an unfamiliar world.

### U.S. Flag Envelope

A familiar sight on public buildings and private homes alike, the American flag has been portrayed in myriad ways on U.S. postage. This stamped envelope features a graphic design of the flag that evokes a rich sense of history even as it presents a recognizable icon in a fresh, contemporary way. Kit Hinrichs created the artwork for this stamped envelope. Due to an overabundance of the current Barn Swallow envelopes still being in inventory, the U.S. Flag Envelope intended for issuance in 2019 will apparently appear in 2020 instead.



### Hanukkah and Kwanzaa

New Hanukkah and Kwanzaa stamps are also planned for issuance in 2020, but images of the designs have not yet been released.

# MEETING MINUTES

## October 23th, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Geoff Owens, President, and presiding. 25 members and one guest were present.
