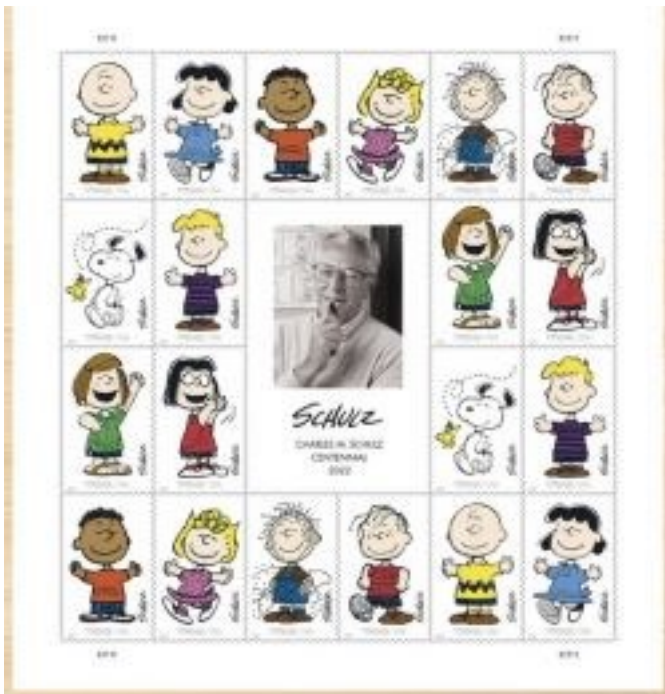

CHARLES SCHULZ STAMPS OVERALL FAVORITE IN LINN'S 2022 U.S. STAMP POLL

The 10 Charles M. Schulz stamps featuring characters from Schulz's beloved Peanuts comic strip were selected by Linn's Stamp News readers as the overall favorite United States 2022 stamp issue.

The stamps were issued Sept. 30, 2022, in conjunction with Schulz's birth centennial. The Charles M. Schulz stamps feature Charlie Brown and 10 other

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USPS ANNOUNCES RATE INCREASES

On April 10th, the United States Postal Service filed notice with the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC) of mailing services price changes to take effect July 9, 2023. The new rates include a three-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp from 63 cents to 66 cents.

If favorably reviewed by the Commission, the proposed increases will raise First-Class Mail prices approximately 5.4 percent to offset the rise in inflation. The price changes have been approved by the Governors of the U.S. Postal Service.

The price for 1-ounce metered mail will increase to 63 cents, and the price to send a domestic postcard will increase to 51 cents. A 1-ounce letter mailed to another country would increase to \$1.50. There will be no change to the single-piece letter and flat additional-ounce price, which remains at 24 cents. The Postal Service is also seeking price adjustments for Special Services products including Certified Mail, Post Office Box rental fees, money order fees and the cost to purchase insurance when mailing an item.

EDITOR'S MUSINGS

I see that the Charles Schultz pane of 20 stamps was voted Overall Favorite for 2022 in the Linn's Stamp Poll. Issued last September, it is already sold-out at Stamp Fulfillment Services, unless you want to pay extra for the "portfolio" or framed copy. In fact, Stamp Market Tips in the April 24th issue of Linn's recommends seeking a pane or two at your local post office (good luck with that!). Nearly all U.S. stamps since the end of World War II are available at a discount from face. The Charles Schultz pane appears to be an exception. Another exception is the 1997 Bugs Bunny pane with the 10th stamp imperforate, face value \$3.20, current retail near \$100 or more. I bought 4 from a friendly post office in Sioux City, Iowa at the time, I wish that I had bought a whole pad of 100 panes.

USPS AGGRESSIVELY PURSUES USE OF COUNTERFEIT POSTAGE

In FY2022, the Postal Service and Postal Inspection Service seized more than 340,000 packages with counterfeit postage and more than 7.7 million counterfeit stamps with an estimated \$7.8 million loss avoidance for the Postal Service. Expanded actions to crack down on fraudulent postage include:

- Postal Service interdictions of packages with counterfeit labels affixed. The Postal Service will fully exercise new authority to take possession and dispose of packages identified with counterfeit postage.
- Reviews of shipments on Postal Service docks and during warehouse outreach visits
- Shut down of websites and closure of eCommerce accounts selling counterfeit postage
- Engagement and partnership with eCommerce companies to disrupt activity
- Customs and Border Protection (CBP) collaboration
- Promotion of the Inspection Service's rewards program which provides rewards for information leading to the arrest and conviction of a person that unlawfully uses, reuses, or forges postage stamps, postage meter stamps, permit imprints, or other postage; or uses, sells, or possesses with the intent to sell any used, forged, or counterfeit postage stamp or other postage.

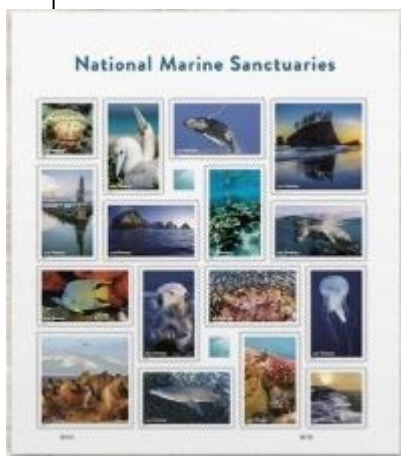
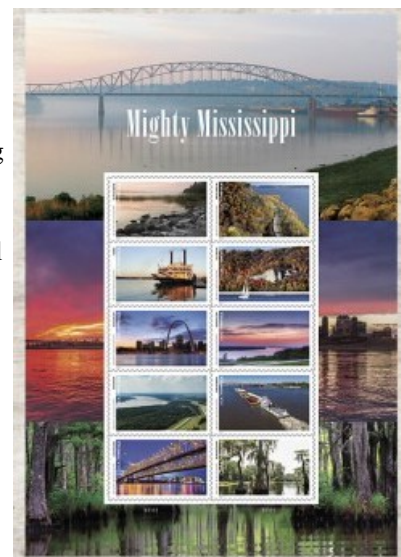

memorable Peanuts characters: Lucy, Franklin, Sally, Pigpen, Linus, Snoopy and Woodstock (shown on one stamp), Schroeder, Peppermint Patty and Marcie. Shown here is a pane of 20 Charles M. Schulz stamps containing two of each stamp and a central label featuring a 1987 photograph of Schulz.valid for use in line with our recent transition to barcodes on definitive stamps.

The Mighty Mississippi stamps placed second in the Overall Favorite category. The stamps feature photographs, each representing a different state traversed by the Mississippi River.



The National Sanctuary stamps placed third in the Overall Favorite Category. The stamps picture photographs of the 15 national marine sanctuaries and two marine national monuments.

WAS THIS STAMP REALLY POSTMARKED BEFORE IT WAS ISSUED?

We all know that stamp collecting expands our knowledge of geography and history, but sometimes arithmetic comes in handy as well.

When I came across this example of China, Scott C6, I was intrigued as it has a clear Hankow CDS dated 14.7.19, (or a broken 8, but for this article we'll assume a 9). However, the catalogue indicates the stamp was issued in 1929. How can that be?



To understand this we must delve into some history. Traditionally the Chinese used a calendar that was based the reign of the current emperor. Where we might say "in the year of our Lord xxxx" they would say in effect "in the year of our emperor xxxx." When the Qing dynasty was deposed and Sun Yat-sen became provisional president of the new Republic of China* he proclaimed that January 1, 1912 would be the official first day of the new government. Although the Gregorian calendar was adopted for some purposes the "Minguo" calendar also came into being for traditional use where Year 1, the first year of the Republic, corresponds to 1912 on the Gregorian calendar.

From my research I understand that the Chinese characters 民國 on documents indicate the Minguo calendar was applicable (I'm happy to be corrected on that point). Regardless, the Minguo calendar is still used on Taiwan today, often interchangeably with the Gregorian calendar.

To translate Minguo dates to Gregorian we add 1,911. Taking the date on the postmark we get $19 + 1,911 = 1930$.

This tells us the stamp was used in 1930, the year after it was issued.

There is one other consideration however, that of date format. What if the date was in YY-MM-DD format instead of MM-DD-YY? Well, that would give $14 + 1,911 = 1925$, which is before the stamp was issued and so cannot be right.

And so, with a bit of history and arithmetic we show that the stamp was not postmarked before it was issued. And all that for a \$3 stamp!

*As an aside, "Republic" in Chinese translates to "people's country" - which makes perfect sense for a democracy replacing a monarchy..

The proposed Mailing Services price changes include:

Letters (metered 1 oz.)	60 cents	63 cents
Domestic Postcards	48 cents	51 cents
International Postcards	\$1.45	\$1.50
International Letter (1 oz.)	\$1.45	\$1.50

As operating expenses fueled by inflation continue to rise and the effects of a previously defective pricing model are still being felt, these price adjustments are needed to provide the Postal Service with much needed revenue to achieve the financial stability sought by its Delivering for America 10-year plan. The prices of the U.S. Postal Service remain among the most affordable in the world.

The PRC will review the changes before they are scheduled to take effect.

POLAND RELEASES CRYPTO POST CARDS

From Poczta Polska

On May 8, Poland issued four unique NFTs (Non-Fungible Tokens), which were created in cooperation with Polish Radio. Each of the Crypto Postcards has a different musical background, and the graphic materials used, with postal motifs, come from the collections of the Museum of Post and Telecommunications in Wrocław.
