### USPS UNVEILS HENRY "HANK" AARON STAMP

#### From the USPS Newsroom

On April 8th, the U.S. Postal Service announced it will honor baseball legend Henry "Hank" Aaron with a commemorative Forever stamp. April 8th was the 50th anniversary of Aaron's record-breaking home run.

This stamp celebrates the life and career of Aaron (1934–2021), a giant both on and off the field, who rose from humble beginnings to rewrite the record books while prevailing in the face of racism.

The stamp art features a digital painting of Aaron as a member of the Atlanta Braves, showing his famous right-handed batting stance from the waist up. The selvage showcases a digital painting of Aaron watching the ball he had just hit for his recordbreaking 715th home run on April 8, 1974.

#### U.S. POSTAL SERVICE RECOMMENDS NEW PRICES FOR JULY 2024

#### From the USPS Newsroom

On April 9th, the U. S. Postal Service filed notice with the Postal Regulatory Commission of mailing services price changes to take effect July 14, 2024. The new rates include a 5-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp from 68 cents to 73 cents.

The proposed adjustments, approved by the governors of the Postal Service, would raise mailing services product prices approximately 7.8 percent. If favorably reviewed by the commission, the price changes would include:

Product	<b>Current Price</b>	<b>Planned Price</b>
Letters (1 oz.)	68 cents	73 cents
Domestic Postcards	53 cents	56 cents
International Postcards	\$1.55	\$1.65
International Letter (1 oz.)	\$1.55	\$1.65

The additional-ounce price for single-piece letters increases from 24 cents to 28 cents. The Postal Service is also seeking price adjustments for Special Services products, including Certified Mail and money order fees. Notably, there will be no price increase for Post Office Box rental fees, and the Postal Service will apply a price reduction of 10 percent for postal insurance when mailing an item.

A few members expressed concern over the upcoming postal rate increase (see the article on the first page of this issue). plunk down cash for new issues, often necessarily in whole panes just to get a single stamp.

Last issue I pointed out a couple of options for collecting "A Stamp for Every Country". Since then I uncovered another option by Don Denman: Stamp Smarter - A Stamp For Every Country Album Pages . The pages are in pdf format, with limited editing capability. The advantage of this option is that there is only one country per page, eliminating the need for editing if one wants to rearrange the pages, geographically for example. The author also provides blank templates to create stamp-issuing entities not covered in his album. I am using these templates to provides spaces for a stamp from every post office abroad-not covered in Denman's album and only partially covered in the albums described in the previous issue.

You will notice that the "Show 'N' Tell" entry in this issue is provided by myself. You are encouraged to send me (stan.bartnikowski@gmail.com) an image of a recent find, with a description, including how you acquired it. Otherwise, you will see entries only by myself-which will tend to Polandrelated areas

# **SPOTLIGHT ON ...** HOWARD PETSCHEL

Interviewed by Stan Bartnikowski

Many of us had the privilege of attending Howard Petschel's presentation on U.S. counterfeits at the club a few months ago. Howard was, after all, the chief postal inspector investigating U.S. counterfeit stamps from 1973 through 1995. He was well-respected not only throughout the U.S. for

detecting counterfeit stamps but also by Canada, England, Germany and other countries. As a postal inspector, Howard was also involved in solving crimes against the post office including robbery. He has published 7 books: 6 on stamp counterfeits and another on postal robbery. Four of these books are still in print and available on



Amazon. I located a fifth in used condition.

Howard hails from St. Paul, Minnesota. Like many of us, he began collecting worldwide stamps at the age of 7 or 8. He has continued to collect to date, with occasional interruptions. After a stint in the U.S. Army including Korea, Howard joined the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, where his interest in stamps led to his assignment investigating counterfeit stamps. Such work required detailed study of U.S. stamps, resulting in a refocus of his collecting efforts on U.S. stamps. Working with the postal inspection authorities in Canada to detect counterfeit stamps there resulted in the expansion of his collecting interest to Canada. He has also begun to collect Israel, and, like most of us, acquires philatelic items that strike his fancy, such as stamps related to the military. Like myself, he obtains some stamps from Golden Valley Auctions in Minnesota, as well as at the club.

Howard lived and travelled all over the U.S. while a postal inspector. As part of his assignment, he was able to attend many philatelic expositions. Howard retired to Sandpoint, Idaho in 1995, where he enjoyed winter skiing and summer canoeing. One of his three daughters persuaded him to move to the Dallas area 15 years ago where has lived since. Howard joined the Dallas-Park Cities Philatelic Society in 2021
