It's never a good day when your car breaks down. But it happened to Viola Desmond, a successful biracial business woman from Halifax, one day in 1946 in the town of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia. Informed by a mechanic that the car wouldn't be repaired until the next day, she booked a hotel room, and decided to take in a showing of The Dark Mirror, starring Olivia de Havilland, at the nearby cinema.

Mrs. Desmond asked for a main floor ticket but instead the clerk gave her an upstairs balcony ticket where non-white patrons were expected to sit at the time. When the ticket-taker refused to let her enter the main auditorium she realized what had happened and asked again to buy a

From what I heard and saw, OKPEX 2024 was a fun, successful show. Rose State College Student Union (in Midwest City) proved to be an excellent venue for the show, which took place June 28th and 29th. The Oklahoma City Stamp Club (OKCSC) has already reserved the Student Union for OKPEX 2025.

Attendance was steady and good for both days. Total attendance was approximately 175 unique persons and a goodly number attended both days. The registration desk, where I worked, was busy throughout the show.

The exhibits were excellent. OKPEX 2024 had a total of 104 frames of exhibits. The award winners were:

- **Grand Award** Les Lanphear of San Diego, CA exhibiting: "U.S. Departmentals 1873-1884."
- Most Popular Award Mark Thompson of Nashville, TN exhibiting "Women of the Black Heritage Series From the Fields of Slavery to the Halls of Congress." Both award winning exhibits were very informative and very beautiful. I also want to praise James Weigant's exhibit: "History of the Osage Indian Reservation As Told Through its Post Offices." In my opinion, this is a fascinating history that was presented in a beautiful, organized arrangement. James is a member of the OKCSC, the Oklahoma Philatelic Society, and the Oklahoma Postal History Society.

In the end, our D.C. adventure was a mix of awe, enlightenment, and a touch of humorous misadventure. For those of you planning similar trips, I hope my experience serves as a gentle reminder to double-check those details and make the most of every opportunity to indulge your passions.

Editor's Note: I lived in the Washington DC area from 1974 to 1985. At that time the precursor of the postal museum was in the Museum of American History. There was an old post office within, with a philatelic clerk. The space was small but one could look at the US collection in pull-out frames - not readily visible to the casual visitor. The much-larger current postal museum is located in the old post office building, across from Union Station.


LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

CZESTOCHOWA LOCAL WWI POSTMARK

During World War I, the German occupiers of what is now Poland were responsible for international mail and mail between cities, but the cities were left to perform local delivery. Many cities, such as Luboml, Przedborz and (initially) Warsaw issued local stamps to pay the local delivery fee. Others, such as Częstochowa, used hand cancels to record the local fee. Częstochowa is about 200 km southwest of Warsaw and, prior to World War I, was part of the Congress Kingdom of Poland, controlled by the Russians. The illustrated cover was mailed in Częstochowa to a local address. It contains a Scott #N1 3 pf stamp in the upper right corner, cancelled "Czenstochau" (German for Częstochowa) in February of 1916. On the left of the envelope is the Częstochowa local hand stamp

in German and Polish indicating "City Post" for Częstochowa. A surcharge of 5 pfennigs was applied for local delivery.

DISTINGUISHING THE NIGERIA 1960'S WILDLIFE DEFINITIVES




Figure 1: Nigeria 1965 wildlife definitive series.

As a boy growing up in Nigeria my favorite stamps were the wildlife definitive series initially issued in 1965 (Figure 1). After all, lions and cheetahs and such are much more interesting than politicians and buildings and conferences.

But it wasn't until I returned to collecting in my 30s that I began to appreciate these stamps for their varieties and subtle differences.

This article is an attempt to explore the distinguishing features of the stamps, as well as to provide some information

that is not mentioned in the Scott catalogue.

The first set of the wildlife definitives was issued in 1965-66, comprising 14 values from ½d to £1. Two printing companies were involved. Harrison and Sons printed the 1d, 2d, 3d, 9d and the later release of the 4d value. Delrieu printed the first release of the 4d value, and all other values in the set. The Harrison stamps were printed on chalk surfaced paper; the

Delrieu stamps on ordinary paper. The 4d stamps can be easily distinguished. The Harrison variety is perf $14 \times 13 \frac{1}{2}$ and the Delrieu is perf $12 \frac{1}{2} \times 12$ (see Figure 2 below).

All of the 1965-66 stamps - with the exception of the 2d and 4d that we'll come to a bit later - can be identified at a glance by the name of the designer, MAURICE FIEVET, inscribed in the bottom margin, with the remainder of the margin being blank.

By 1969, printing of most Nigerian stamps was transferred to the Nigerian Security Printing and Minting Company, Ltd. The entire set of stamps - less the ½d, 1 ½d, and £1 values - was reprinted. These can be identified by the additional inscription of NSP&M Co Ltd in the bottom margin along with the original MAURICE FIEVET. (Figure 3 below.)

Adding a bit of challenge, however, is that the margin imprint occurs in two sizes on the 2d and 3d values. The MAURICE FIEVET is either 5 mm or 5 ½ mm wide on the 2d, and either 5 ½ or 8 ½ mm wide on the 3d. (See Figures 4 and 5.) The wider imprint on the 2d is scarcer than the narrow. A narrow inscription also exists on the 4d value, but this is



extremely scarce and is not listed in Scott.

Finally, the 2d and 4d values were reprinted again in 1970 and 1971 respectively, this time by the Dutch firm, Jos. Enschede. In both cases there is of course no NSP&M Co Ltd inscription. For the 2d value the distinction lies in the value being printed entirely in white without the yellow accent of the earlier versions. (Figure 6).

The 4d Enschede value is identified by thicker lettering for the "4d" and with less prominent violet shading. The lettering of "REPUBLIC" is also noticeably thicker and the MAURICE FIEVET is on the right side of the stamp, rather than on the left as on the 1965 versions. (Figure 7).

Oddly, Scott lists the Enschede stamps together with the 1965-66 set, as #187a and #189b respectively.

Note that Stanley Gibbons lists some minor color varieties but as those are not essential to associating the stamps to the printers we won't detail them here.

Hopefully this discussion will prove useful and enhance your appreciation of these interesting stamps.

main floor ticket. Denied a second time she went ahead and seated herself downstairs. The manager was summoned who asked her to move. When she refused the police were called and she was forcibly removed and taken to jail.

The next day she was taken before a magistrate. However, unlike the situation with Rosa Parks nine years later in

had not purchased the higher priced ticket - although she had tried to - the magistrate ruled that she had committed tax fraud in the amount of one cent and levied a fine of \$20 plus court costs.

Although Viola had little interest in being an activist her case was taken up by civil rights groups, eventually going all the way to the Supreme Court, which ruled against her.

The story was kept alive though and finally in 2010, many years after her death in 1965, the government of Nova Scotia issued a posthumous pardon. In 2012 Canada Post honored Viola Desmond with a stamp (Scott #2521). And in 2018 she became the first non-royal or non-prime minister to be featured on the obverse of a Canadian banknote.

Montgomery, Alabama, in Canada there were no laws regarding segregation, it was just an "understanding." So Viola had broken no law by sitting in the main auditorium. But the magistrate found a way out; there was an "amusement tax" charged for theater tickets and the like. The tax on the cheaper balcony tickets was two cents, and the tax on the more expensive main floor tickets was three

cents. Because Viola


SPOTLIGHT ON ...

BEN SCHKOLNE

Interviewed by Stan Bartnikowski

Ben Schkolne is originally from Cape Town, South Africa where he went to medical school specializing in anesthesiology. He began his residency there but got a green card to emigrate to the United States in 1978, where he completed his residency at Duke University in Durham, North

Carolina. After a stint on the anesthesiology faculty at Duke, Ben entered private practice as an anesthesiologist in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Around 2015, he retired to Dallas to be near his daughter, where he soon joined the Dallas-Park Cities Philatelic Society. He was previously a member of the



Winston-Salem stamp club, a smaller club that met monthly.

Ben began collecting stamps in his youth but put stamps aside while he focused on his medical training and subsequent career as an anesthesiologist. About 20 years ago, he renewed his interest in philately. His main interest is in the philately of South Africa, including the provinces of Cape Town, Natal, Orange Free State and Transvaal. He recently spent some time with fellow DPCPS member Geoff Owens cataloging the varieties of bilingual pairs from South Africa (the languages being English and Afrikaans).

Ben also collects Israel stamps with tabs and FDCs. He is especially proud of his copy of the first issue of 9 stamps, noting the need to certify this issue. In addition, Ben collects US. He recalls advice given to him years ago by a fellow collector in the Winston-Salem club to invest in quality classic US stamps. At that time, he purchased a complete mint set of mint Columbians, very expensive at the time but now completely out of reach. At the time I called him for the interview he was busy sorting through Philippizne stamps.

Ben acquires his stamps mostly from online auction houses, but not eBay, which is fraught with incorrectly described stamps and other problems.



Inked Print: United States Postal Counterfeits Illustrated by H.K. Petschel

This book, compiled by DPCPS member Howard Petschel, is essential if you are interested in U.S. postal counterfeits. Even if are not so interested, this full size (8 1/2 x 11) volume contains many beautiful over-sized prints of U.S.




counterfeits dating back to 1895. These prints are larger than and in finer detail than those in the Scott 2023 Specialized Catalogue of United States Counterfeits, reviewed in the April, 2023 edition of this newsletter. They begin with the 1895 Chicago counterfeits of the 2 cent Washington Type I (Scott 250) and conclude with counterfeits of the 2009 flag stamps.

A standard paperback is

available from Amazon at \$40. A "Mass market" paperback version, also available, does not make sense at \$100.

Robbing the Post Office by H.K. Petschel

Another book by our DPCPS member Howard. Beginning with the \$2 million+ 1924 Rondout, Illinois train robbery and continuing with the Leonard Street (New York)



mail robbery and other postal robberies, the book not only describes - in painstaking detail - the crime and its perpetrators, but also how the perpetrators were identified and apprehended and how the criminal case was prosecuted. It also describes the 1962 Plymouth, Massachusetts robbery which was not successfully resolved due to some very smart criminals, disappearing key witnesses (thanks to the mob), and the emergence of the brilliant defense law F. Lee Bailey.



CORRECT RESPONSE: Who Is Alex Trebek?

On July 22, the U.S Postal Service celebrated the life and legacy of beloved "JEOPARDY!" host Alex Trebek with a Forever stamp. The dedication ceremony was held at Sony Pictures Studios in Culver City.

The grid of 20 stamps evokes the bank of video monitors that forms the "JEOPARDY!" game board. Each stamp reads "THIS NATURALIZED U.S. CITIZEN HOSTED THE QUIZ SHOW 'JEOPARDY!' FOR 37 SEASONS." Underneath, upside down, is the correct response: "Who is Alex Trebek?"

Born in Sudbury, Ontario, Canada, Alex Trebek became a naturalized U.S. citizen in 1998. He began hosting the syndicated series "JEOPARDY!" in 1984, and his to-thepoint approach and crisp enunciation served the quiz show well. "JEOPARDY!" became a phenomenal success with Trebek at the helm. His respect for contestants' intelligence always came through, as did flashes of his pithy humor.

Among numerous honors, he won a lifetime achievement Emmy Award and eight Daytime Emmys for outstanding game show host. After a brave public battle with pancreatic cancer, he died on Nov. 8, 2020. Sony Pictures Stage 10, where "JEOPARDY!" is still taped, has been renamed the Alex Trebek Stage.

Antonio Alcalá was the art director and designer for the stamp project, using photography provided by Sony Pictures Entertainment and hand lettering by Marti Davila.
