THREE MILLION STAMPS NEEDED!

Boston 2026 World Expo calls on all collectors to donate off-paper stamps to build its inventory for use in welcome packets and the youth and beginners' areas during America's next international philatelic exhibition.

Coordinating the collection process is Michael Lawson, Boston 2026 Chief Financial Officer, in association with the Spellman Museum of Stamps and Postal History. "World Stamp Show-NY 2016 collected roughly three million stamps for free giveaways in a variety of ways," said Lawson.

"We are again counting on the philatelic community to show their generosity and desire to promote the hobby by donating common, unwanted duplicates we all have an abundance of to our show."

It may be hard to grasp that many stamps, but artificial intelligence can help. Google's Gemini explained it this way. With an average thickness of 0.01 inches per stamp, a three million stamp stack would span 2,500 feet, nearly half a mile, or roughly the height of a 200-story building.

Donations of any quantity would be welcomed, mint and used, but all should be off-paper and sorted by US and non-US if possible. Any on-paper material is to be soaked before sending. Stamp clubs are especially encouraged to participate by holding a soaking/collection program with their members.

Dealer stock, including hundreds of the same stamp, may also be sent. Any glassines and tweezers,tongs sent are much appreciated. As a 501(c)3 organization, Boston 2026 donations may be tax-deductible to the donor.



U.S. Scott UX17 Postal Card

Dear Fellow Stamp Enthusiasts,

Sometimes, you just have to take a chance...

Last month, I found myself at home, feeling uninspired with no new philatelic material to explore. Having already gone through Jack's and Jim Meyer's albums, I was at a bit of a loss. With nothing else to do, I turned to my computer and began checking emails. That's when I came across a notification from the Stamp Auction Network—Sam Houston Philatelics' auction was ending soon.

It had been years since I last revisited my U.S. collection, but something caught my eye: a striking UX17 U.S. postal card. I quickly realized that this was a piece I had long been missing. The card itself is a rarity—only 500 were ever issued, featuring President McKinley's portrait. All of them were purchased by a single company, Messrs. Booth, Dailey & Ivins, which had been contracted by the city of New York to dispose of waste at sea. These cards were used by ship captains to document the proper disposal of trash.

The particular card I had found in the auction was a fascinating historical artifact—recording that "Dumper No. 19"

EDITOR'S MUSINGS

With the new U.S. Presidential Administration, several changes in the philatelic landscape are possible. For one, we may see a return of Canal Zone stamps, if the U.S. retakes the Panama Canal. For another, Palestinian Authority stamps may become valid only in the West Bank, if the U.S. takes over administration of the Gaza strip. Stamps issued by the U.S. Administration in Gaza would probably be used. Greenland could stop issuing its own stamps, if the U.S. takes over that country. Less likely is the disappearance of stamps from Canada, the "51st state". Stay tuned.

SPOTLIGHT ON ... GEORGE CLAYTON

George Clayton was born in Washington, D.C. and moved to Fort Worth at age 7. He had a career of 37 years at LTV, where he was a "rocket scientist". His work included working with the Air Force and Navy where he worked at the USS Enterprise aircraft carrier. He also boasts being a catcher on a world-series winning softball team. After retirement from LTV, George was an usher at the Texas Ranger home games. George moved to the Edgemere in 2013, where he became a member of the Dallas -Park Cities Philatelic Society. As you know, George serves as the club's liaison with Edgemere. So far he has done pretty well, allowing us to meet in the big room

for free, despite frequent changes in Edgemere management.

Unlike most of us, George did not start collecting stamps as a youth, but in his early 40s collecting with his son. He began collecting in earnest about 10 years later when the baseball card industry went bonkers, resulting in his phasing out of that hobby and spending more time on stamps.

George specializes in stamps

in stamps commemorating John F. Kennedy (7 albums) and U.S. presidents (another 7 albums). He also has a worldwide collection (4 albums) and a U.S. mint collection up to about 1976. However, he sees himself as primarily a topical collector and has less interest in the more "technical" aspects of philately.

Jim Dempsey (1931-2025)

Stamp dealer Jim Dempsey, age 93, of Walnut Creek, California passed away on January 9, 2025. He founded and owned A&D Stamps, one of the few stamp dealers truly stocking the entire world. He brought his huge inventory to stamp shows and exhibitions all over the country, including, until a few years

ago, TEXPEX and Mid-Cities Expo.

FRENCH BAGUETTE STAMP

On a recent trip to Paris I picked up this copy of a unique issue from La Poste. The stamp is printed with an ink containing "microcapsules" of the aroma of fresh baked baguettes. Yes, a scratch-n-sniff stamp!



Designed by illustrator Stephane Humbert-Basset they were introduced on May 16, 2024, in honor of Saint-Honoré, patron saint of bakers and pastry chefs, with general release on May 17. The stamps were printed in sheets of 15. The stamp shown is from the center position in the top row. Total quantity issued was reported to be 594,000. My understanding is that these are already sold out. I was unable to find what catalogue number Scott has assigned, or if they have yet.

Sources differ whether these were specifically issued for the Olympic Games - nothing on them implies that - but they do conveniently have the international rate for mailing postcards or standard letters back home for any foreign attendees at the games.


And, no, I have not scratched my example!

BOOK REVIEW

Spurious Stamps: A History of U.S. Postal Counterfeits by H.K. Petschel

This book, written by DPCPS member Howard Petschel, describes the counterfeiting of U. S. postage stamps, other stamps and postal cards, beginning with

the 2 cent George Washington bureau issue of 1894 through the 1975 13 cent Liberty Bell definitive. Howard focuses on the individuals counterfeiting, why they counterfeited, how they counterfeited and distributed, as well as the authorities apprehending and prosecuting them.

Howard went to the Federal archives, the court case documents and philatelic and general news media to provide detailed accounts of the counterfeiting operations and the apprehension and conviction (in most cases) of the criminals. You will read about how the Secret Service outwitted attempts by one of the perpetrator's attorneys to avoid her extradition from Canada. You will see how legitimate engravers unwittingly contributed to the counterfeit McKinley postal card. And how the mob got involved with counterfeiting.

Howard includes a section listing the laws regarding possession of counterfeit and details arguments whether or not stamp collectors can retain counterfeit stamps for non-postal

By the way, Howard didn't originate use of the word "Spurious" to describe counterfeits, as in his title. This term was used to describe counterfeits at least as early as 1895 by the Chicago Tribune and the 3rd Assistant Postmaster General.


